EU International Partnerships

- Team Europe remains the biggest development partner providing 55% of the ODA for education globally.
- The EU has prioritized education by scaling up funding from 7% to 13% for 2021-2027. Over EUR 6 billion and most of the EU's investment will be in Africa
- The EU and its Member States are working on 40 Team Europe Initiatives around the world to support education and training at country level.
- The EU investment in education in emergencies reaches 10% of its humanitarian aid budget, i.e. over EUR 150 million per year.







 The EU's main financing tool contributing to eradicate poverty and promote sustainable development, prosperity, peace and stability.

The total allocation (€79.5 billion) is divided as follows:

- €60.38 billion for geographic programmes
- €6.36 billion for thematic programmes
- €3.18 billion for rapid response actions

Africa-Europe Global Gateway Investment Package

Flagship initiatives at regional level are in the process of development:

- The Regional Teacher Programme for Africa (EU: EUR 100 million); Team Europe approach
 - Opportunity driven skills and VET in Africa (EU: at least EUR 500 million); Team Europe approach
- Youth Mobility for Africa (EU: EUR 970 million) will promote youth exchanges and mobility between Africa and Europe;
 - Global Partnership for Education (Team Europe: EUR 1.7 billion)

European Consensus on Development from 2017

- making better use of funding/support modalities, tools and partners and the wealth of the collective experience, expertise and resources.











Regional Teacher Programme for Sub-Saharan Africa (€100 MIL)

- 1. Improve the governance, management, attractiveness and gender balance of the teaching profession
- 2. Enhance the quality, relevance and effectiveness of initial teacher training and continuous teacher professional development
- A <u>Regional Teacher Facility</u> to support interventions for strengthening the teacher profession and improving quality of teacher professional development, with a focus on digital and green skills and on teachers in fragile and crisis affected environments

Tunisia: a new EUR 65 MIL programme in 2022 to improve:

- the governance and digitalisation,
- the quality and access of primary education, as well as the matching of university curricula and VET training with the needs of the job market to create sustainable opportunities for the youth.

Morocco the Programme Intégré d'Appui à la Formation et à l'Education au Maroc « PIAFE », 140 million EUR

- to improve the supply of quality education and training accessible to all, meeting needs of young people
- also a programme supporting high level education, research, innovation and mobility



Youth Action Plan in EU external action

- Adopted in October 2022, first-ever policy framework for a strategic partnership with young people around the world to build a more resilient, inclusive and sustainable future
- One aim is to Strengthening young people's capacity to contribute to sustainable development and drive the green and digital transitions

Funding programmes and initiatives

- **Erasmus+, 46 higher education partnerships** involving 35 African countries will start in Q4 2022 (results in October) in key priority areas such as agro-entrepreneurship, access to electricity, space, energy, mining and healthcare.






International dimension of Erasmus+ 2021-2027

Capacity building for Higher Education

- Develop and adapt curricula, in terms of content and teaching/learning methods
- Support university-enterprise cooperation
- Work on upskilling of academic and administrative staff
- Reform of governance and management systems at national, regional or HEI level
- Foster internationalisation of HEIs in research, scientific and technological innovation
- Introduce Bologna-type reforms at institutional, national or regional level
- Develop ew approaches and tools for policy making and monitoring

The Applicant can be in Europe or in an African Country.

Minimum 4 organisations
Minimum 1 HEI from 2 Programme
Countries and 2 HEIs from one or more Non
Associated Countries.

The number of organisations from Programme countries should not be higher than the number of organisations from Non Associated countries



One action – 3 strands to better answer needs

FOSTERING ACCESS TO COOPERATION IN HIGHER EDUCATION

- Smaller scope projects
- Focused on higher education institutions.
- Designed for newcomers to the programme, less involved countries/regions, and for disadvantaged target groups.
- Enhance management capacities, quality of education and accessibility
- Budget between 200 000 and 400 000€
- 2-3 years.

PARTNERSHIPS FOR TRANSFORMATION IN HIGHER EDUCATION

- Focused on higher education institutions and local actors linked with industry
- Designed to have a larger impact on innovation, university/business relations and institutional governance.
- Promoting reforms in universities

- Budget between 400 000 and 800 000€
- 2-3 years.

STRUCTURAL REFORM PROJECTS

- Focus on macro level policy reforms
- Involve national competent authorities, HE sector and institutions
- Support Policy making (expert advice, training, creation of representative bodies ...)
- Develop Implementation of tools (Quality assurance, credit systems, accreditation procedures, recognition...)
- Support Internationalisation (Bologna type reforms, surveys and studies...)
- Budget between 800 000 and 1M€
- 3-4 years.

Erasmus Mundus Joint Masters (EMJM)

University perspective

- Integrated Masters of excellence offered by a consortia of universities. At least 3 partners from 3 countries (including 2 European ones)
- Jointly delivered programmes with study in 2+ countries, of which at least one must be an EU Member State or third country associated to the programme
- Aim to attract the best students in the world through EU-funded scholarships
- 6-year project 4 cohorts of students


